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## What?

• Development, piloting and dissemination of telecollaboration modules for Heritage Spanish and Mandarin Chinese courses at both four-year institutions and community colleges.

#### Why?

- Telecollaboration:
  - $\circ$  establishes an ideal pedagogical setting to explore linguistic diversity and variation;
  - o engages heritage language learners (HLLs) in the practice of multiliteracies;
  - requires HLLs to construct their own notions of language proficiency, culture, and ethnolinguistic identity;
  - $\circ$  fosters independent learning, as a student-centered pedagogy;
  - provides a realistic, effective way to develop intercultural competence and linguistic capabilities in cases where traditional study abroad is not accessible to students.

### How?

- Through modules built around collaboration with HLL peers from different areas of the United States or native speakers abroad.
- Students collaborate with their partners using social media, custom-built websites, video conferencing, and/or mobile apps such as WeChat.

## Latinos en EEUU Latinos in the USA

*Faculty:* Prof. Laura Villa, Queens College, City University of New York Prof. María J. Barros García, St. Xavier University (Chicago, IL)

- Heritage learners at the two universities paired to compare their experiences as US Latinos.
- Organized around two modules, "Identities" and "Histories."
- Students explore sociopolitical and sociolinguistic issues in the configuration of Latino communities and identities.

#### Mapas alternos: Comunidades latinas de Nueva York y San Francisco Alternative Maps: Latino Communities of New York and San Francisco

- *Faculty*: Prof. Aránzazu Borrachero, Queensboro Community College, City University of New York Prof. Pedro Lange-Churión, University of San Francisco (San Francisco, CA)
  - Heritage learners at two universities paired to compare their experiences as US Latinos.
  - Organized around four modules, "The Self," "The College," "Family and Migration," and "Latino Communities."
    - Students begin by exploring conceptions of the self, then expand their gazes to encompass different contexts of higher education, Latino communities, and the urban spaces they inhabit.

#### Heritage Language Learning Through WeChat Exchanges

*Faculty:* Prof. Xiao Li, Queens College, City University of New York Beijing International Studies University (Beijing, China)

- Students enrolled in Elementary Chinese for Heritage Learners at Queens College paired with first-year English majors in Beijing.
- Exchange uses WeChat, a mobile messaging platform popular in Asia and Asian diaspora communities.
- Intercultural comparison and contrast of practices and perspectives on topics such as college education, urban life, and national holidays.

#### Intercultural Discussions via Smartphones

*Faculty*: Prof. Wei-Yi Cheng, Hunter College, City University of New York Prof. Yun Guo, Inner Mongolia Normal University (Hohhot, China)

- Students enrolled in Intermediate Chinese for Heritage Learners students at Hunter College paired with students enrolled in a second-semester English course in Hohhot.
- Exchange uses WeChat, a mobile messaging platform popular in Asia and Asian diaspora communities.
- Intercultural comparison and contrast of practices and perspectives on topics such as food trends, food globalization, and nutrition.
